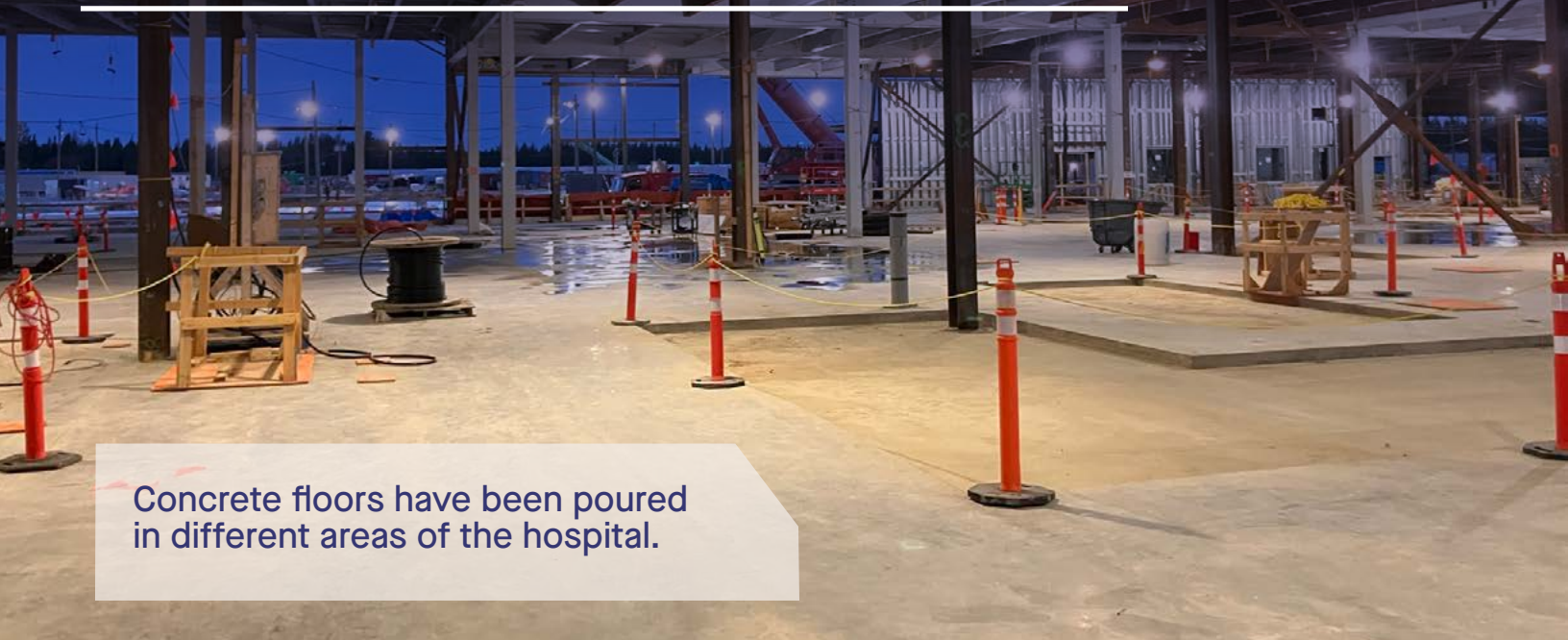

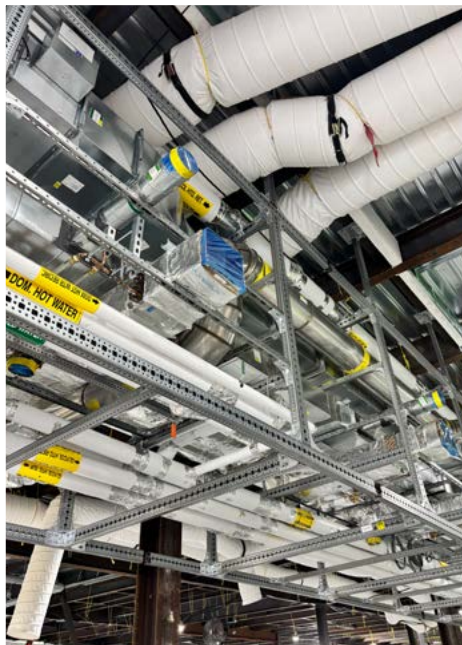
CONSTRUCTION ZONE

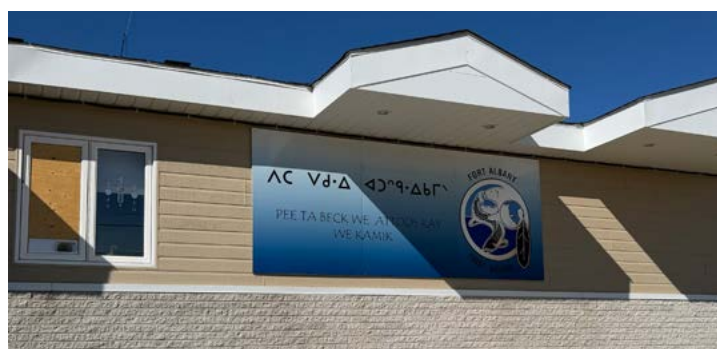
